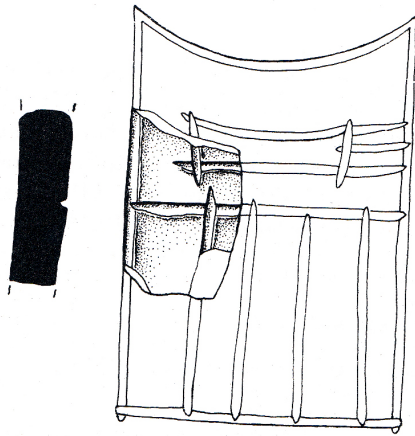


Plate 1b. Incised serekh sign fragment of Narmer (photograph by Z. Radovan).
